Original Abstract as Submitted:

This round table discussion will highlight the innovative approaches that Asian American librarians are currently undertaking in collaborating across campus and communities, with a particular focus on efforts to support diversity and inclusion on campus and political and social activism in Asian American communities off campus. According to a recent study by the UCLA Center for the Study of Inequality and the Asian Pacific American Institute for Congressional Studies (APAICS), the Asian American population will grow by 74% between 2015 and 2040 and the Asian American electorate will more than double and grow by 107%. The increase of Asian American and Pacific Islanders will certainly diversify and shift communities across the United States. This kind of significant change in demographics will have a direct impact on library services and resources and creates new opportunities for collaboration between faculty, students, and librarians working in the field of Asian American Studies.

Based on a newly edited volume entitled *Asian American Librarians and Library Services: Activism, Collaboration and Strategies*, this roundtable brings together Asian American scholars and librarians who advocate for new services, programs and partnerships to support various communities in the U.S.
