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TITLE OF PROJECT: Assessing Preferences for Collections Access: Poster Session

Time Period of Grant: 2013-2014 Amount of Award Received: \$500.00 Original Abstract as Submitted:

Due to seismic retrofitting and fire safety requirements, the UCSB Library needs to permanently relocate up to 20% of the collections. To mitigate the on-site losses, it was critical to obtain information from faculty and graduate students about impacts of alternatives for accessing materials. In spring 2012, an ad hoc committee of faculty and student representatives was convened to advise the library. Working with a library support team of three in collaboration with the UCSB Social Science survey Center, the committee developed the UCSB Library Collections Survey, designed to answer two primary questions:

- 1. What are behaviors and preferences relative to accessing the Library's physical collections?
- 2. What are the perceived impacts to research and instruction associated with alternative access strategies?

The survey was distributed to all faculty and graduate students in May 2012. Based on the survey outcomes and data, several planning options were identified for achieving the needed reduction of the onsite collection with the least impact to research and teaching. The six broad strategies that we are using, and which we will detail in the poster session, are based on these planning options and are consistent with the survey data.

The poster was created for the conference as it was proposed: it addressed results from a survey used to assess collection use behaviors and described the strategies used to reduce the library's onsite collection.
